

Athletic Information

Student-athletes who wish to participate in NCAA Division I or Division II sports in college **must be certified** by the [NCAA Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse](#) which will analyze your academic information to determine if you meet NCAA initial-eligibility requirements.

Carefully examine the "[Prospective Student-Athletes](#)" section of the NCAA Eligibility Center web site. Don't delay this process -- if you are uncertain about participation in Division I or Division II it is best to complete the described processes anyway. These steps do not bind you to participate; however, they are necessary procedures should you elect to participate. Failure to be certified may affect visitations to colleges regarding athletics, and college coaches may be reluctant to make commitments to athletes who have not completed the NCAA Initial-Eligibility certification.
